The Chairman Report

I have been reading through the early books of the OT again and one thing I have been noticing is the concern God has for those with economic disadvantage - the widow, the fatherless and those who are poor.

The other day I read Deuteronomy 26 a lovely account of how God requested the people of Israel to offer a one off tithe when they entered the promised land. The people were to set aside a tenth of all their produce in the third year after they entered Palestine " to give it to the Levite, the alien, the fatherless and the widow, so they may eat in your towns and be satisfied".

God made provision for those less well off and those who appear to have missed out on the benefits of family life. In a country without a state welfare support system this religious obligation was critical to the well being of the nation.

God's people are to share the land flowing with milk and honey - even with those who were aliens - outside the faith.

This encouragement is an obligation on the

people but it is meant to be one that is fulfilled from the heart "carefully observe (these decrees and laws) with all your heart and with all your soul".

We often contrast the law of the OT with grace in the NT but Deuteronomy - the most personal of all of the early books - repeats the encouragement to be totally involved and committed to God's ways. I have often puzzled at Jesus' attacking of the Pharisees but I guess one of the things he was concerned about was the way they undermined the heart and soul response to God's laws.

May we who have experienced the wonder of grace embrace some of the generosity of spirit to those who are left out of the system. Temcare has been the beneficiary of the generosity of many imbued with a desire to show in a practical way a heart and soul for God's ways.

In early 2013, Temcare conducted an evaluation of its services by Jeremy Scrivens from The Emotional Economy at Work. Jeremy conducted workshops with three separate groups – clients, volunteers and staff. The responses were very encouraging and highlighted the authenticity and strengths of Temcare's work as well as opportunities into the future. You will find quotes from the evaluation throughout this report. It has been a privilege to work with such a great team of staff over the last 12 months. As highlighted in their reports, the commitment, care and practical support offered to families and clients has been exceptional which is a real credit to their genuine care for the people they work with. Family situations can get very difficult, with issues of addictions, homelessness and child protection continuing to complicate the support that is being offered through mentoring and respite care.

Our annual camps remain a highlight for families, young people and children, with the staff continuing to see great results from all the hard work that goes into organising them. Additionally, volunteer training nights have been well attended and well received.

Temcare's work relies largely on the commitment of our volunteers. Our volunteers often make this work part of their calling in life and this reflects in both the quality of care and the length of the time they volunteer for. We would like to thank the Lord for the commitment of the following volunteers and the time they have given families that Temcare supports. Kerry Jolly – 25 years, Peter and Bronwyn Muscat – 20 years, Val McPerson (still officially a Carer) – 19 years, Phil and Glenda Yelland – 18 years and Glen and Katrina Jackson – 13 years. As you would agree, this is a remarkable dedication to supporting families.

Our great team of staff and volunteers at our Oakleigh Opportunity Shop continue to

serve faithfully throughout the year. Working diligently under the support of Val, they continue to be a "listening ear" to the community while bringing in a small revenue for the work of Temcare. I am also very grateful for all the other volunteers who serve through our programs, camps, Board, prayer groups and assessment teams. Every member is a valuable part of the work we do!

I would like to also welcome our two most recent staff members. Adrian McClymont who worked closely with the residents at Gracecourt and the Independent Living Units. Adrian, now a Temcare employee, continues his support the Unit residents while looking at other ways to support the more isolated elderly members in our community. Mary Chin was employed one day a week as a Bookkeeper and has, like Adrian, fitted into the team really well. Welcome both Adrian and Mary.

We are thankful to the support of churches and the many ways they give to the work of Temcare. Last year, three churches in particular supported Temcare through donating Christmas gifts which were given to families at our annual Christmas function. The children love receiving these gifts and we want to thank Edge, Canterbury Gardens and Bridge churches for their support in this way. There are many ways churches can continue to support our work and we would love to chat with you more about this.

Into the future, one of Temcare's greatest needs is to address the growing waiting list for children and families needing support through our programs. Care



For this report, we decided as a team, to focus on some of the themes which emerged from the Temcare Evaluation that was conducted earlier this year. Upon re-reading the evaluation and reflecting upon the work that we undertake, and in particular my role in the respite care area, I was struck by the word 'being'.

'Being' which incorporates such things as availability, listening, encouraging, supporting, caring, and being authentically Christian. Some of the comments in the evaluation which describe this sense of being were..."the quality of personal relationships is everything at Temcare and we strive to be authentic which is a bigger value than compliance" and probably one of my favourite statements, "At our best we are 'being well', not just doing well. At Temcare we help people to 'be well' which means we invest in relationship and building up people".

These are all nice quotes, but how does this translate into the work I am doing? There are so many stories I could share, where do I begin, and how do I paint a picture with this snap shot moment I have? Maybe I will tell you a little about my last week, and even the morning I have had as I have endeavoured to write this report.

In the past week I have had clients struggling to overcome addictions, with their children's behaviours, with poverty, with the challenges of being a sole parent, with children who are becoming parents themselves and are homeless, to name but a few of the massive issues and heartbreak we are confronted with on a weekly basis. I have supported these clients by listening, organizing respite placements, following up with how they are, liaising with Department of Human Services workers and emergency housing workers amongst a host of other things. I have attempted to show the love of Christ by being available including after hours, I have visited people,

prayed with them on the phone etc etc. This morning while I was working, a client rang from court distressed because her daughter had broken an order yet again, and faces her children being taken away. I was so glad this lady called and we could pray together over the phone. These clients have also been supported by our amazing volunteers who are at the coal face; having children in their homes, listening, supporting, encouraging, taking the time to get to know them and build relationship. Often times our volunteers are supporting the family as well, taking time to listen before or after a respite placement, providing a break for these parents and a safe and loving environment while the children are in care.






Coach & School Based Mentoring

In the past 12 months Temcare COACH has almost doubled in size. Well yes we were pretty small to begin with but it has been encouraging to see the program progressing. Temcare COACH, like our other programs, is relationally based and we can see from the Temcare Evaluation which was conducted in early 2013 that this is the sort of program many Christians are seeking as a way to express their love for God and their love for people in their community. The COACH program is client centred and goal focused so taking pressure off the volunteer to have to be the expert. This is simply about making yourself available to listen, encourage and love someone who is having a difficult time in life. And as a volunteer is amazing to see how your talents and interests can be used to enrich the relationship over time.



Authenticity and unconditional love are qualities that as Christians we are called to have. The women that we support through Temcare COACH recognize these qualities in our volunteers and therefore do not feel

judged or looked down upon. They make themselves vulnerable, willing to risk telling all, in the hope that this new person in their lives might assist them in making things a little brighter. As volunteers and for myself as a worker, we are privileged to share in this journey.

School Based Mentoring

It has been another positive and productive year for school based mentoring at Chairo Christian School. We have seen some students continue into their second year, while other students who were mentees in 2012 become mentors in 2013. The program aims to link senior school students as mentors to middle school students who normally meet once a week to do an activity together during lunch. We hope this will encourage the mentee at school and create a positive approach to education through creating positive relationships. The school chaplains are at school to offer daily support. The interest and commitment among the students is encouraging to see and the chaplains have received positive feedback from middle school teachers about the benefits the program has had on some students.

Currently there are around 40 students involved and each year I have the opportunity to train and follow up with students. Chairo is also currently exploring a Facebook support page for the mentors. On one occasion this year, I had an opportunity to speak to a group of mentees who shared with me their joy and interest in having a mentor. This was a great reminder of the positive relationships such a program is developing.

I would like to thank Chairo Christian School for their willingness to give this program a go and especially the Chaplains and other staff who have been committed to the program (and students), making it possible to have another successful year.

This past year has been a fantastic year for the Mates Program. Barry Ibrahim ran the program until September 2012 then I came on board to continue his excellent work. Upon beginning with the Mates Program, I became aware that we were facilitating opportunities for 'family away from family'. In November at Camp at Phillip Island, it became clear that a supportive community existed beyond the one-to-one mentoring. While there were several new people on camp, there were many people on camp who have been coming for years and had such a long history with the mentors and mentees. It was such an enjoyable time and when Sunday came and it was time to go home, no one wanted to leave! One of Temcare's major strengths is providing long-term support as transformation takes time. In February this year an evaluation was done of our work and the families in their feedback shared that they appreciated Temcare's commitment during throughout their journey. Our volunteers are generous and genuine people who are committed to their mentee, regularly spending time with them, speaking with them on the phone and bringing them to group outings so they are a part of a positive and accepting community. Our volunteers are the ones who make it possible to provide support for the long-haul as they show such commitment and time. Each volunteer is truly inspirational because they see their mentee as valuable and are committed to their growth. Just as Christ gave his life as a sacrifice, our volunteers are continually giving up their Saturdays, time, energy and effort to share hope with their young person. It has been great to hear of several opportunities mentor's have had over the last year to share Christ with their mentee and family.

A wonderful attribute of Temcare is being able to connect families to several of our services to provide more support. This year I have received referrals from both the Respite and Coach program and two of these are now involved in Mates, one comes to group activities and camps and the other has officially been matched with a volunteer who became available in her area. The parents

and guardians of these young people are happy for the young people to be a part of the Mates Program because they have had positive experiences with us already. It is great to be able to provide more holistic care for the families in this way. Our only limitation is not being able to make more mentoring matches because we do not have volunteers available.





Throughout the year we have run several group activities every few months to further connect mentors and mentees to each other. A thriving community is formed and relationships and friendships have deepened and strengthened with more regular activities and contact. We have 9 year olds through to 16 year olds in our program and through these activities they have all better connected with each other besides their differences in age. This year Mates has facilitated several indoor sports events, trips to the beach, BBQ's and cinema outings and these have been an enjoyable time for all. It is incredible to see the smiles of the young people who have such a fun day with all the mentors and mentees. Their parents and guardians are grateful we organize these days too. Activities are run in both the North West and South East because our program is growing and supports young people and their families across Melbourne. We have had three new matches established over the last 12 months which is such a success to have 3 less young people off the waiting list. There will also be 2 to 3 more matches by the end of 2013. There were also 6 new volunteers who attended the Annual Mates Training Day in May who showed interest in becoming a mentor in the future. We also had 7 people who volunteered for camp in 2012 and 3 of these are now accredited mentors.

Momentum is building for what will be another brilliant camp at CYC this November and then we will all come together at Christmas time to share a meal and hope with one another.

Many services have particular targets and short term goals which leaves mums with ongoing problems without much needed support at vulnerable times. Jesus asks us to walk the journey with people for the long haul - this Temcare always tries to do.

In September a highlight, as it has been for many years now, is to get together for a weekend of Bible Study and prayer. We are grateful for the help of Sue Diggles and Mary Jones in leadership and for the willingness of the mums to share their hopes and fears so that they can be supported with prayer and love.





Recruitment & training



When it comes the human needs in our community, we so often see these people as numbers. The newspapers report that there are over 700,000 people in Australia who are unemployed. The television tells us that there are 5,000 people in Melbourne who are homeless each night. Over 2,000,000 people in Australia live below the poverty line. These numbers can be overwhelming. These numbers don't tell the whole truth or the whole story.

A few months ago I visited India on a short-term missions exposure trip. My time in India was amazing – but it was also overwhelming. There was so much to process. The city I visited, Bangalore, has a population of over 8,000,000 people. It is in the state of Karnataka, which has over 60,000,000. In a country of over a billion people! At last official count, there are 862 slums in Bangalore. There were people everywhere – too many to count. Most who would be judged as extremely poor compared to Australian standards. But when I reflect on my time in India, it is not the enormity of the need that I remember, or the amount of people I encountered. It was a little six year old girl Meghala that I never met, who died of malnutrition a day before we visited her home. It was the family who served as the local church in one of the poorest slums in the city. It was the faith of the pastor and his wife to live amongst the poorest of the poor. It was his daughter-in-law, who stayed with the church after her husband died. It was the fact that the only meal this little girl Meghala received consistently was the lunch that this small church served every day for the little kids. It was meeting Meghala's mother, who is blind, and her older sister. Numbers mean more when we know the people and the stories behind them.

This year at Temcare we took part in an evaluation of our ministry. This was an opportunity for people to give feedback in regards to all aspects of our work. Volunteers, the people we serve, staff, committee members, board members...all were given a voice in this evaluation. This evaluation was a great opportunity to hear

the thoughts, observations, ideas and wishes of members of the Temcare family, but the real blessing for me, and our staff, was hearing how Temcare had affected them on a personal level. We heard stories of the people we assist. We were encouraged by what our volunteers shared. The focus was on people and their lives. People who Temcare volunteers helped in their time of greatest need. People who trust Temcare. The courage it took for some people to ask for help. The continued commitment our volunteers have shown in the lives of the people they provide respite for or mentor.

So often we rely on numbers to stir people to reach out to those in need. A month or two ago we identified that we have about 75 children on our waiting list. That is effectively 75 families requiring a respite carer or youth mentor. It is very easy to find this number overwhelming. We have almost as many children on our waiting list as we have currently being cared for or mentored. But I've come to realize that it's not about having 75 on our waiting list. It's about the one! The one child whose story we don't yet know but whose story can be the one where a Temcare volunteer makes a difference.

Over the last 12 months, my contact with churches and individuals has seen 6 volunteers (from 4 households) join the Temcare team. Each one is a valuable member! We are grateful for all our current volunteers, whether they're long term ones, ones who have been with us for a short while or the new ones just starting. Thank you for being a part of the Temcare family and for your commitment to the one child or youth or parent or family you help. Just as we've been encouraged by the stories of those we serve and the stories of our volunteers, we encourage you – our volunteers and supporters – to tell people the story of why you serve and support Temcare. We believe that when we look past the numbers and see the person, then we will see people rise up to help. Thanks!

Aged Care Work

As Grace Court Hostel (GCH) closed, it was my role to keep in touch with residents as they moved to new accommodation. A common feed-back theme from both former residents and family concerning this role was the appreciation that CBCC had not abandoned them but kept in touch. I have also found that former residents often ask about how other former residents are getting on showing the degree of warmth and connection that staff and residents had when at GCH. This is an enormous commendation of the manner in which GCH was run by management and staff – GCH was “home”.

The former residents, in general, moved into aged care facilities that were not too far removed from Kew with some exceptions; one moved to Ocean Grove and another to Cahuna so it was not practical to keep in touch with them. All are well cared for, well settled in their new locations and are happy.

Since GCH closed, I have had weekly sessions spent with the residents of Grace Court Units (GCU) organizing chapel services and other activities such as board games, word games, movies and outings. Outings have taken us to Elwood Beach, Williamstown, Olinda and the like. Just

getting out and having coffee together has been greatly appreciated. On other occasions we have gone to the Jewish museum and the Chinese museum. For some of these outings, we have hired a bus through Eastern Transport Register, with whom we are a member, and for an annual fee, we are able to hire a bus for \$30 and day plus 30c mileage - very reasonable.

Part of my role as Aged Care Chaplain, is to try and develop an aged care ministry as part of Temcare's role in helping the disadvantaged and marginalized among the elderly. Aged care is a new area for Temcare; the role of development is challenging for me as I see myself more of a come-along-side sort of person. However I have excellent support from others at Temcare to enable this to happen. Churches generally have pastoral care ministries but some may like to have additional support which Temcare can now provide. Contact with and an ongoing relationship with church leaders is a crucial element in providing spiritual care to those who are isolated and lonely. This role is not to take away from local church ministries but to work with and supplement church activities taking the individual needs of the elderly into account.

This role has been a huge blessing and I thank the Lord for the many opportunities I have had to share Jesus with others.
